Be it remembered that on this fifteenth day of June eighteen hundred and eighteen came before me, the subscriber an associate judge in and for said County, Maxwell Saul King of said County in his own proper person who being sworn in due form of Law Deposeth and saith that he enlisted as a private soldier in the service of the United States in the Revolutionary war against the Common enemy in the month of May of the year one thousand seven hundred & seventy seven in the company of Captain Theophilus Munson which belonged then to the eighth Connecticut Regiment Colonel — Chandler; in Brigade Genl Pearson's Brigade, and in said company belonging to the Connecticut line he served three years, was in the battle of Monmouth & other engagements and from the continental service aforesaid was regularly discharged on the tenth day of May <sup>seventeen</sup> ~~eighteen~~ hundred and eighty received said discharge from Col

Isaac Sherman bel at that time of said Regiment  
at Westfield New Jersey. which said discharge  
has since been accidentally lost - That by reason  
of said reduced circumstances he needs  
the assistance of his country for sup-  
port - and further this deponent saith  
not

The state of Ohio Delaware County, Jo.

On this seventeenth day of September 1838, personally appeared before the court of Common Pleas, of said County Eunice Caulkins, a resident of Berlin township, ~~indeed~~ County aged seventy-five years, who, being duly sworn according to law, hath, on his oath, made the following Declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress, passed July 7, 1838, entitled "an act granting half pay & pensions to certain widows;" That she is the widow of Roswell Caulkins, who was a private in the army of the Revolution, having entered the service, by enlistment for three years, sometime in the summer of 1776, being then in the 16th year of his age and a resident of the town of Waterbury, New-Haven County, state of Connecticut; He served out said term of three years, and afterwards & previous to the close of the war served two tours more, equal in all to about four years service. The names of the particular corps, in which, & the officers under whom, the said Roswell Caulkins served, are to this applicant unknown. Said Roswell Caulkins was a pensioner under the act of 18th March 1816, his certificate of which, bears date "fourteenth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four" Dated on the back thereof "9.194." She is <sup>the wife</sup> confident that all the requisite particulars of service or will be found in connection with the application for his pension, <sup>on the rolls of the War Department.</sup> She has always understood from her said husband & others, <sup>and verily believes</sup> that he participated in the battle of Monmouth & was at the storming of Stony Point. <sup>See</sup> She has no documentary evidence in support of his claim except that already referred to on the files of the War Department. Her marriage with the said Roswell Caulkins took place at Waterbury, Connecticut, on the 8th day of September 1782, after the expiration of the last period of his service. The ceremony was performed by Samuel Lewis, Esq. a Justice of the Peace. She

has no record of said marriage, except that kept in the family Bible, which agrees with the statement herein made being in these words - "We were married at Waterbury Sept. 8th 1782."

Madam:

I have to advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 4915, it appears that Roswell Gaulkins was born October 6, 1761 at Walpole, New Hampshire.

While residing at Waterbury, New Haven County, Connecticut, he enlisted in May 1777 and served three years as a private in Captain Theophilus Munson's Company. Colonels Chandler<sup>3</sup> and Isaac Sherman's Connecticut Regiment, and was in the battle<sup>s</sup> of Monmouth and Stony Point, and others names not given.

After this he served one year, names of officers not stated.

He was allowed pension on his application executed June 15, 1818, while a resident of Delaware County, Ohio. He died November 15, 1833 at Berlin Town-

ship, Delaware County, Ohio.

Soldier married September 8, 1783 at Waterbury, Connecticut, Eunice Hine. She was born May 13, 1763 in Derby, Connecticut, and was allowed pension on her application executed September 17, 1838, while living in Berlin Township, Ohio.
